1. How would you prioritize using the funds provided to WV by the CARES Act and other COVID-19 relief funds?

The congressional stimulus awarded to WV for COVID relief was \$1.25MM. The check came with specific guidelines. We have little leeway in appropriations to government entities', businesses, organizations, or residents. Caution must be taken to insure guidelines are followed. Appropriations outside those guidelines will result in a requirement to pay millions of dollars back to the federal government.

- 2. What changes in current election laws would you favor to make voting safer and more accessible? Voting is the most important activity we have to protect our democracy. Safeguards are in place to protect the integrity of the ballot. Current laws provide safeguards and adequate opportunities for a fair election. Residents who are eligible for absentee ballots, scheduled early voting, and traditional election day voting are guaranteed that right to vote.
- 3. Lack of broadband access limits employment and educational opportunities in many parts of West Virginia. What should be done to make broadband available statewide?

In most cases, broadband systems are operated by phone or cable companies. Their franchises are controlled by the legislature. Mandating phone and cable companies to provide broadband services to every customer could be the answer. Tax Credits could be offered to these companies to defer the cost of installation. Installing these systems would provide better educational and business opportunities.

4. Given COVID-19, how do you propose we protect our students, teachers and school service personnel while at the same time providing equal access to a quality education across the state?

Eliminating unnecessary exposure will slow the spread of COVID. Children attending classes on a 5 day schedule are exposed to the same small group routinely. Students that attend classes 2 days per week, and the rest of the week in childcare experience 2 to 3 times more exposure and have a higher risk of spreading the virus to others.

5. What experience, training or education do you have that would make you an effective state legislator? First elected to House of Delegates in 2014, re-elected in 2016-18. Vice-Chair of the House Energy Committee; and serve on Education, Veteran Affairs and Homeland Security, Political Sub-Divisions, and Senior and Family Issues Committees. I served 14 years on the Parkersburg City Council, and am an Air Force Veteran (67-71). Retired from DuPont.

1. How would you prioritize using the funds provided to WV by the CARES Act and other COVID-19 relief funds?

Funding public health resources must be prioritized. Establish a funding oversight coalition to prevent waste. Strengthen public health response increasing testing capacity, purchasing PPE, and allocating funds to employ contact tracers. Providing direct assistance to people who are struggling to pay rent, utilities because of the economic crisis and fund childcare infrastructure. Provide additional funding for stretched counties and cities.

- **2.** What changes in current election laws would you favor to make voting safer and more accessible? Five states have successful mail-in ballot systems. Automatic voter registration and ballot mailing with drop boxes for easy collection. Protecting the integrity of voter registration systems, pollbooks, and election websites, as well as ballot preparation, voting machines, and tabulation systems will continue to evolve necessitating ongoing evaluation and improving WV election system security. Voting machines must have paper audit trail.
- 3. Lack of broadband access limits employment and educational opportunities in many parts of West Virginia. What should be done to make broadband available statewide?

Regulators will soon determine if "financially qualified" Frontier can bid on Federal \$766 million. Frontier should not be allowed to participate due to bankruptcy and mismanagement track record. New providers such as SpaceX Starlink must be considered when comparing costs with fiber cable. Strict oversight is critical to insure WV access to a fundamental utility without being fleeced again

4. Given COVID-19, how do you propose we protect our students, teachers and school service personnel while at the same time providing equal access to a quality education across the state?

Teachers/School Service Personnel must have input in ongoing COVID Response safety in our schools. The West Virginia color-coded map determines school status weekly. Officials have relied on outdated data, raised cutoffs determining county's risk level, changing methodology determining the metrics for safety/risk. Transparency is critical and games with how cases are counted damage the credibility of WV DHHR/Gov officials.

5. What experience, training or education do you have that would make you an effective state legislator? Education and experience in management and human resources provides a unique blend of skills in problem solving and policy development. Training in problem solving methods like Six Sigma gives an advantage of data/science based analysis along with bringing people together to build support for opportunities to make better policies and laws for a fair and thriving WV for us all.

WV needs automatic voter registration upon your 18th birthday, ballot drop-boxes in every district, and an end to partisan gerrymandering. Permit ranked choice voting that would allow people to vote third party, without "throwing away their vote".
- 3. Lack of broadband access limits employment and educational opportunities in many parts of West Virginia. What should be done to make broadband available statewide?

Broadband needs to be a public utility where we prioritize West Virginians and public good over price gouging monopolies that provide inferior service. Build the "middle mile" and lay over 2,000 miles of fiberoptic cable which would create over 5,000 jobs. Strengthen broadband connectivity standards to mitigate the gap in education and economic opportunities for distance workers, educators, and students.

4. Given COVID-19, how do you propose we protect our students, teachers and school service personnel while at the same time providing equal access to a quality education across the state?

Virtual learning is not an adequate substitute for physical classes. Our goal must be a return to in person learning by suppressing the transmission of covid19 to control state and local outbreaks. In order to protect teachers and students, until covid19 is contained, distance learning should be implemented and once we return to school, all necessary PPE should be provided.

5. What experience, training or education do you have that would make you an effective state legislator?
